What have we done?

After four and a half years we have enough records to look back and see how reality is different from our initial expectations. I for one imagined that after the initial rush of enthusiasm the need for training and commitment to it would fall away. In fact the time on the water has remained remarkably constant. This is partly because some crew have left for a variety of reasons and new members have joined and require training. Training of the current crew is an ongoing process.

It was hard to foresee in 2007 how the pressure to find and stay in work would require even the most committed to move away.

The attendance at the weekly crew meeting has also remained undiminished. There is so much happening in Operations, Education, Sea Safety and on the fundraising side that it is difficult to see how we could all keep up without it and the weekly summary that follows.

An observation from Dartmouth Coast Guard Station Officer Andy Pound who said that "in the two years before there was a lifeboat on the Dart the land based CG Teams would have benefited from the services of a boat on 50% of their callouts" was one of the pointers towards the need for a lifeboat here. In the event 28% of our launches have been involved in searches, almost invariably in association with land based coastguard teams from Dartmouth or Berry Head and with other Emergency services, such as the Police.

been to incidents there. But how many do you think were in the river North of the Higher Ferry or to incidents out in Start Bay?

Of the ninety nine vessels we have launched to assist 52% have been motorboats, but sail craft are not far behind at 37%. The latter have required assistance for a variety of reasons. Crab pot lines round the prop have entangled three. Capsizes accounted for another pair. Two more sprang leaks and a third ran aground. One single handed sailor had simply fallen asleep and was drifting onto rocks.

Question 2. What was the length of the largest yacht we have been called to?

A final question – How many times have we rescued the same boat?

If you want a tie breaker – how many individual inshore lifeboats have been on service from the Dart lifeboat station this Century?

The condition had not responded to his own medication and he requested medical help. The inshore lifeboat attended and he was assessed and treated by the paramedic crew member. He was given oxygen and transferred by lifeboat to a waiting ambulance on the Higher ferry slipway for onward transfer to Torbay Hospital.
141	09/03/12 Friday 11.57	3 adults	Mouth of the Dart	The 31ft Moody yacht Viadante was on the final leg of a training week with a local skipper and two crew on board. She began to take in water through the stern gland and propeller shaft and the lifeboat was asked to shadow her to her berth at the Darthaven Marina in case of complications. This was achieved without incident. The lifeboat was unable to launch from her usual slip next to the Higher Ferry due to the extremely low tide. The tide had fallen to less than 0.4m with half an hour to go before low water. Launching from the Lower Ferry slip was achieved without incident although the lifeboat could not be recovered for another one and a half hours after she had left the casualty. She was placed back on service whilst still on the water.

Launch 141 was the second to a vessel taking on water. In October 2010 a 30ft yacht on the deep water moorings developed a leak and the crew called for assistance. On that occasion the Dart Harbour Authority salvage pump was available and was used. The lifeboat

transferred another pump from a yacht and then towed the yacht to Darthaven Marina for a lift out.

At weekends and after hours the DHNA workshop is not open and it was agreed by the Divisional Inspector that, exceptionally for a station with only an ILB, Dart could

keep a donated 2inch petrol driven pump for emergency use.

Blue water pedigree:

Local boy, 80 sets sail for the Azores in aid of the RNLI Dart Lifeboat *Spirit of the Dart.*

Born and bred in his home port of Dartmouth, Dennis Courtney is no stranger to the sea. Starting out as a Fitter and Turner with Philip & Son, where he met local Kingswear girl and wife-to-be Thelma, Dennis moved into the drawing office as engineer draftsmen in 1947, before stepping aboard with Shell Tankers in 1952 for 4 years on the ocean wave. Another 3 years as chief engineer for Metcalf Motor Coasters saw Dennis graduate to blue water life before a growing family took him back to ship building.

Dennis is proud Skipper and custodian of the fine-lined and beautifully proportioned Quadrille; an exemplar of the Camper & Nicholson stable. Her modest length of 31 feet a solid testament to the architects who drew her back in 1975, and her exceptional condition a reflection of Dennis' own skilled hand and passion for his craft. With over 70,000 nautical miles registered on her log since acquiring her in 1984, Dennis has covered nearly as many miles in his 31 footer as he did as an engineer on tankers, probably more, and certainly with a few more stories to tell!

This is Quadrille's third visit to the Azores, the last seeing Quadrille beat hard to windward in a gale on the outward leg only to become desperately becalmed and surrounded by a shoal of Whales for the best part of two days on her return voyage. A heavy displacement long keeled sloop with a pure blue water pedigree, Quadrille has surpassed all expectation, keeping Dennis and all those who have been fortunate enough to help trim her sails safe in all weathers.

As well as the Azores, Quadrille has nosed her way into most ports around the British Isles in two circumnavigations, and has been dazzled by lighthouses in an extensive cruising ground ranging from Gibraltar to the Orkney Islands.

With a passion for all things boats and sailing, and ambitions of a full time career on the sea, sole crew member James Taylor – over 50 years junior to his veteran skipper - met Dennis in their local tavern in Dawlish. 'I was enjoying a quiet jar one evening when above the natter I heard this eloquent Gent talking about boats - my kind of bloke I thought to myself!'

21, James grew up in London and moved to Devon to get closer to the sea; more recently ditching his paint brush and tile cutter for the engine bays and gleaming topsides of charter yachts in the Greek islands. 'I've got my Yachtmaster theory and with a

few more miles under Quadrille's keel I'll be well on my way to the practical exam and a life aboard boats.'

So after such an illustrious skippering career, much since retirement, why put Quadrille through it again? 'The old girl's getting restless!' Dennis chuckles heartily, the glint of the ocean wave clearly in his eye once more. 'James needs the sea time and Quadrille needs the exercise!'

With only weeks to go before the start of her next 3,000 mile adventure, Quadrille waits patiently in her berth on the Dart, and will be slipping her lines from the Town Quay in Dartmouth on May 27th. The voyage will begin with a day sail to Plymouth followed by a hop down to Fowey, then across Biscay to La Cornona on the northern Spanish coast. This will set her up nicely for a third visit to the Azores, a group of Portuguese islands famous for their juicy pineapples and smoldering volcanoes and situated a third of the way between Europe and North America.

Of course Quadrille will take it all in her stride, a remarkable boat with an even more remarkable skipper. And it is testament that reaching the ripe old age of 80 doesn't mean that your sailing boots have to be hung up for decoration. 'Give up sailing, you'll be lucky!' smiles Dennis, 'I'm only a boy you know!'

The first Storm Force afternoon at the Dart lifeboat station



Storm Force is the RNLI Junior Membership for 5 to 11 year olds.

Although the programme is still at the planning stage we hope to open the lifeboat station on Coronation Park Dartmouth around 1pm. As well as a really close up look at the inshore lifeboat there will be several other teams present on the day.

Two of the lifeboat crew are in the South RNLI Flood Rescue team. The Flood Rescue vehicle with all their equipment will be coming from Saltash and the crew will be there to tell the Storm Force members how they have been trained to get people out of cars that are being swept away and how to carry out swift water rescues.

Another crewman is also an RNLI Lifeguard. We plan to have one of their beach rescue vehicles present carrying all the different beach rescue equipment. Storm Force members will all know the different flags that the lifeguards use but the Education volunteer will be on hand to see how good they are at "Spotting the dangers" when they visit a beach and what the different signs mean on the beach safety boards.

On many of our launches the lifeboat crew work closely with the land based Dartmouth Coastguard Cliff Rescue team. If all goes well they will also be there with their equipment, as well as demonstrating how the two teams work together.

The day has been chosen so that the tides are right for the inshore lifeboat to carry out a lifesaving demonstration easily seen by the Storm Force members on the Embankment. However there is always the possibility that the Coastguard team or the lifeboat may be called away for operational reasons.


This afternoon is by invitation only to Storm Force members in the TQ and PL postcodes. It is not open to children of the general public.

Who needs Friends?

There are at present 103 supporters of the Dart inshore lifeboat who have signed up as Friends. The majority did this in the early days when we were fighting to find a site for the station and to get the lifeboat established on the Dart.

That was five years ago and much has changed since then. We are on the 2nd version of our local RNLI web site and "Dart D'Tales" has progressed from a single A4 sheet to a glossy eight page issue that is read and appreciated within the RNLI and by its supporters, as well as by the wider public. The aim of both these channels is to keep the Dart station favourably in the public eye.

In those five years much has also been achieved by the Dart RNLI team. The station is one of the three busiest in the charity amongst the thirty six where there is only a D class lifeboat on station. The local fundraising team, along with active contributions from the crew, generous donors and third party events, have very nearly managed to match the annual operational costs of the station for the last two years; a rare achievement within the organisation.

"Dart D'Tales" and the website are funded by the advertisers to the newsletter. We pay "By the Dart" to distribute our newsletter where our areas overlap. We believe that the 266 National RNLI members who keep their boats on the Dart or are in contact with the local station should continue to be kept informed, as well as those who have donated to the station in the past. Most of these 400 are sent by post and the cost is about to rise dramatically, as have all the other costs of production. **Although we receive no funding from their national RNLI membership only 21 of the 266 members are also enrolled as Friends**. It should be pointed out that Jeff Cooper, We Make Magazines, who is the brilliant design consultant of "Dart D'tales", gives his services free and Pete Callis and Ralph Seeley both designed our respective local web sites at no cost to the RNLI.

The bottom line is that we can just about cover our costs with an eight page issue with eight advertisers. However we lose about £100 with every four page issue with four advertisers. With costs such as postage due to rise again steeply we need the Friends to contribute annually rather than occasionally. In the past these contributions have been quite varied but never less than £5 per Friend. Please fill in the form on the reverse even if you feel unable to contribute at the present time. Helm revision day

Chris Tracey, Rob Clements, LOM, and Mark Strudwick, DLA, came up with the idea of having a day devoted to combating any possible skill fade amongst the seven helmsmen in the Dart lifeboat team. The four original helms, Chris Tracey, Kevin Murphy, Andy Pomeroy and Chris Wallace had been on their helmsman courses at Poole three years ago. The other three; Buster Hart, Squiff Howitt and Tony Chapman, had been more recently. Lloyd Turner has stood

down due to the pressure of work. There had been no previous self assessment and it would be a helpful exercise to establish that everyone was still singing from the same song sheet.

Initially half of the helms went out in the boat and each had to teach a standard operating procedure. Whilst this was happening the others sat a standard helm's test used during previous courses at Poole. This was provided by Tom Mansell, Divisional Training Inspector from Saltash. After each session the groups went through the teaching and the papers together before swapping over activities for the afternoon. At the end of the day there was a further debrief.

In any teaching role it is only too easy to concentrate on the areas where you are most confident. The group all agreed that it was a very worthwhile exercise and plan to repeat it every six months.

Five of the current lifeboat crew have also expressed an interest in beginning the training to qualify as helmsmen. \bullet

Events on the station's social and fundraising programme will be posted up, as well as current photographs of the team's Operational, Educational, Sea Safety and Fundraising activities.


Work on developing the facebook page is in progress. Please do click the "Like" invitation on the page and it will become a useful new contact for a range of people who do not regularly open the station website.


The supporters of the Dart lifeboat turned up trumps when it came to raising money for the crew's new lifejackets. Much has already been written in the local press, in
