The RNLI Visitor Centre on Dartmouth's South **Embankment was opened by Sarah Wollaston MP** on Thursday 31 March 2016.

Sarah was introduced by Stephanie Pavie, RNLI Public Engagement Manager, who also read out a message from Paul Boissier, Chief Executive of the RNLI. 'I am sorry that I cannot be with you today to celebrate this milestone event for the community and the committed RNLI volunteers of Dartmouth. This Visitor Centre is a leap forward for our retail and visitor experience, enabling us to showcase the brave and courageous work of our lifesavers. This Centre is the first of its kind for the RNLI and will inspire and engage current and future RNLI supporters for many years to come.

Coastal path saw a presumed upturned dinghy off Old Mill Cove, N.E. of the Mewstone. They reported it to the volunteers at the Froward Point Coast Watch Station who informed HMCG Solent. The RNLI Dart inshore lifeboat was deployed to investigate. They found an eight foot tender, practically submerged. It had drifted in the gusty 27 knot winds to a position off Kelly's Cove. All the indications suggested that it was unlikely that there had been anyone in the boat when it was lost. The tender was towed into Dartmouth Harbour.
251	10/03/16 Thursday 12.37am Video on Dart RNLI web site	5 adults	Off the South Embankment Dartmouth Harbour	Five seamen rescued from French trawler. Three French pair trawlers from Cherbourg had sought shelter in Dartmouth Harbour from the very rough conditions at sea. Two of them, the Sagittaire and the Saint Christophe were tied up to the Town Quay when the emergency services were called. Both of the trawlers were listing severely. There was a report of a fire on board one and both crews needed evacuation. The Dart inshore lifeboat evacuated three of the crew from the Sagittaire over the stern and then returned for the next two, one of whom had to be lowered from the transom with a rope. The Fire Service rescued the crew of the Saint Christophe by ladder and established that there was no fire. The Spring tide was at its lowest at 12.33am and it became apparent that the Saint Christophe was not re-righting herself. The lifeboat crew were asked to establish whether there was internal flooding in the vessel. They did so and found it to be severe. The two French crews were taken to the lifeboat station for hot drinks and overnight shelter. An environmental protection boom was placed round the vessel by the Dart Harbour Authority.
252	12/03/16 Saturday 3.10pm	1 dog	Dittisham River Dart	Retriever retrieved. No sooner had the Dart lifeboat station been cleared after the annual free lifejacket check than the pagers sounded. Harlem, an 11 year old Golden Retriever, had dashed into the river 200m upstream of the Dittisham Sailing Club boat park. The inshore lifeboat was initially asked to provide safety

Mike Bennett, from the sailing club was standing in the river beside the dog, which was up to its belly in the mud. The dog was rapidly tiring and it took the combined efforts of Mike Bennett, two from the Fire Service, a Coastguard and two of the lifeboat crew to free him. He was landed from the lifeboat on the sailing club slip and returned to his grateful owner.

Sarah Wollaston then cut the ribbon across the doorway and ushered in the many enthusiastic visitors and supporters who had come to take part in the celebration.


AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE TO ALL FRIENDS AND SUPPORTERS OF RNLI DART

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History.

The £24 million RNLI All-weather Lifeboat Centre (ALC) was opened, on budget, in March 2014 and aims to save the donors between £3 and £4 million a year, which is a significant return on their investment. The factory will be at full production level by 2019. During the design stage the RNLI held workshops with other partners in the marine industry where they discussed processes that had worked best for them and what they would have changed. The input from the RNLI Inshore Lifeboat

Centre in East Cowes was crucial as they had pioneered the use of 'lean working' within the RNLI.

Production.

Severn, Trent and Tamar all weather lifeboats (ALBs), and the fleet of seven hovercraft, will all eventually be maintained and refitted here and six Shannon class lifeboats will be built each year for the next 10 – 12 years. For the next two years Trent and Severn class ALBs will still be refitted in external

boatyards until the ALC is fully ramped up. A decision has yet to be reached on a Trent replacement as there is a significant height difference between the Trent and a Shannon.

Layout.

The ALC consists of two blocks, linked by a covered aisle. Building A, on the left holds three paint booths. A fully built Severn class ALB, with its

mast down, can fit into booths one and two and wheelhouses and other smaller components are painted in the third.

The Shannon hull and wheelhouse are currently built by SAR Composites; a fully RNLI owned subsidiary in Lymington. They will have transferred that process to Building A by the end of June 2016, bringing their workforce with them.

Working with composites and paint generates particulates that are dangerous to health and so a particulate removal system is installed throughout Building A, but it is not required in Building B, thus reducing costs.

The roofed central aisle is 23m wide; enough to give a boat-mover room to place a Severn ALB in a paint booth or a repair bay in Building B.

Building B is where the ALB and Hovercraft refits, repairs and maintenance are carried out, as well as the building of the Shannon class. The overall impression of the Centre from outside illustrates how well the building complements the rest of the Campus.


Building the Shannon class ALB.

Over sixteen weeks the hull and wheelhouse are prepared in moulds in Building A, before being detached from one another and transferred to Building B. They will be kept apart until the final fit-out. Over the next eight weeks pads

are placed on the bulkheads using jigs to position them, saving time and expense, and then components are fixed to the pads. Very little is stored on-site and components come in kit form, on a daily basis, from the Lifeboat Support centre over the road.

During this stage the main emphasis is on the fitting of the water jets. (The two 650HP engines drive the waterjets which can displace 2.5 tonnes of water per second giving a new boat a top speed in excess of 30 knots and the ability to reach 25 knots throughout its working life. It also has the ability to stop within one and a half boat lengths from 25 knots.) After this stage the two halves are sent back across the aisle to the paint booths.

During the final fitting out stage back in Building B the hull and wheelhouse are glued together and a laminate is placed over the bond before sacrificial fenders are fitted over that. The final fitting out work can be carried out from three levels as a fully adjustable working deck surrounds the boat. It gives good headroom for those on the lowest level and saves components and tools having to be lifted onto the next level, allowing safe and efficient working conditions.

Environmental aspects.

When the channels in Poole harbour were dredged the spoil was brought ashore to the site of the new ALC by barge, thus saving 5000 truck movements. The site, which included reclaimed land, had to be

raised by 1.4m in comparison to the 1m above sea level that was required when the College site was built 12 years ago. The factory was then supported by 2100 vertical concrete piles. Holes Bay was declared a Nature park in 2015 and the demolition of the old site was delayed so as not to disturb any of the 85 species of over-wintering birds. There is a semipermeable membrane used on the blast slab where the boats are washed down and substances, such as anti-fouling, are trapped by it. The membrane is then disposed of separately before the treated water is returned to the Bay. The roof of the ALC is covered with solar panels which feed into the campus-wide grid.

The work force.

In order to staff the ALC the RNLI recruited 50 new workers to complement the 40 existing staff. The management is committed to employing six new apprentices each year, drawn from different trades. They are not limited to chargeable work and spent spend time within other departments of the RNLI such as Fundraising, Education and Health and Safety. The aim is that when they reach the end of their apprenticeship they will have become 'RNLI Citizens' and will want to continue to work for the Charity.

Cosandra Fleet number 13-12.

The ALC bell was brought from the RNLI maintenance facility at Borehamwood. It was rung at the opening ceremony of

the ALC and again when Shannon class lifeboats completed at the ALC commence their harbour and seagoing trials. Cosandra was the first Shannon class lifeboat to be completed at the ALC.

John McCallion said: 'I was very proud when Cosandra was handed over to the fleet. My role is one of supportive management, to enable our skilled craftsmen to do what they do best. Their expertise enables the volunteer crews to go out and save lives and that is why it is so important for us all to continue with the very high quality of work taking place here.'

Youth Education Conference

The Conference was spread out over three days in March this year and held at the RNLI College at Poole. Forty six delegates attended from venues as far apart as Cornwall and the North of Scotland. Those attending the packed programme of inspirational speakers, thought-provoking films and practical brain storming workshops, brought a vast range of experience to the meeting. I managed to pick up several ideas and film presentations and hope to use them in local schools and our newly opened Dartmouth RNLI Visitor Centre.

A psychologist gave us an insight into how learning styles change across the age ranges. The experiences of those who specialised in working with the over 15 year olds were particularly interesting and so different from the techniques used by those of us working with the Primary age range. The older ages are often influenced by peer pressure and alcohol and the effect of these can have an enormous influence on decision making; not always for the better.

If the only message we have for the 16 year olds and older about tombstoning is "stop!" it will not be listened to or acted upon. It led to an interesting debate as to whether we should in fact teach them where the dangers in tombstoning lie; shallow water injuries, the effect of the tide on water levels, under-water


dangers such as entrapping weed, debris and rocks, cold water shock and more. In Fife in Scotland two boys died whilst tombstoning, within nine months of each other, in the same quarry. The presentation that had the greatest affect on us over the whole Conference was given by the mother whose 18 year old son was the first to die. He had broken his neck as he entered the water. She has joined a team of Education volunteers from the RNLI and representatives from the Police and Fire Service, to go into schools and to speak to the older students. She spoke movingly about the effect his death had on his family and friends, both in his community and school. She was asked at the Conference why was she re-living such a painful experience? She replied, "I would not want anyone else to go through it." It was a very powerful message.

The next task for the local Education volunteer team will be to take the RNLI Beach Safety presentation to the Primary schools in Dartmouth and Totnes in the two weeks before the May half term. Hopefully there will be no mention of tombstoning.

The 2016 season has seen the RNLI Lifeguards patrolling the full two week Easter holiday period at Bantham beach which is a significant step forward for the service.


